#### **DRY JULY**


Farmers would agree that it was a dry July as only 30 mm of rain was recorded in Riverton (at time of writing) during what is often the wettest month of the year.

#### WOOLSHED FLAT METHODIST CHURCH



The Woolshed Flat Methodist Church. situated on the Rhynie to Balaklava Road. is one of the oldest churches in SA. Built on an acre of land donated by Mr James Kemp, the church cost a total of 63 pounds to build, the funds being raised by donations. The chapel seated up to 90 people and was built from 100 loads of sandstone from a quarry opposite the building site. It opened for worship on 7th August 1859. A Sunday School was built in 1866 and attended by up to 40 children. Unfortunately, this building demolished in 1946 due to deterioration caused by salt damp. The last official service at the church was on 18th April 1971, although it is still used for weddings. funerals and other functions.

Inside the church are the original kerosine lamps, pews and pulpit while outside the gates have been sandblasted back to their original state.

A significant amount of renovation work has recently been carried out on the heritage listed church.

This has included

- External storm water drainage
- Significant Earth works at the rear of the church
- Replacement of stones in the back wall from the original quarry
- Internal painting of the church
- Restoration of various headstones in the grave yard by family members.

The above restoration work will help to ensure the ongoing survival of this

wonderful historic building for generations

to treasure and enjoy.

Future plans include the erection of a shelter shed in the grounds.



In addition to countless hours of voluntary labour, \$25000 from the Church Fund was used to finance the renovations. However, the Management Committee of the church were disappointed not to receive any heritage grants. Donations to help with future maintenance and upgrade would be most welcome at any time.
