Riverton District Soldiers' Memorial Hospital Centenary

Riverton and the wider community are lucky to have a hospital facility still operational with a resident doctor managing patients in both the hospital and the senior citizens' home, as well as seeing many patients through the consulting rooms located on the hospital grounds.

This year the hospital will celebrate its' centenary event at the Riverton Community Hall on Sunday 9th of July.

The first sod of soil for the Riverton Hospital was turned on July 18 1922 and later that year the Foundation Stone was laid. The contractors made good headway and the hospital was officially opened by Lady Bridges, wife of the Governor of South Australia on June 21 1923.

Additions to the original 12 bed facility over the last 100 years have been many.

1928 - A Maternity Wing with 8 beds 1930 - An all weather sleepout attached to the Nurses Home

1938 - An extension on the eastern end to house the Xray unit

1956 – A nurses Home, built as a memorial to the men & women who made the supreme sacrifice during World War II

1960's – Men's & Ladies' Wards extended & private rooms refurbished

1972 – Major additions & refurbishments were carried out. These included six private rooms with shared ensuites, both major & minor Operating Theatres, Xray unit,

Recovery Room, Labour Ward & Nursery,
Kitchen, enlarged Staff Dining Room and
Lecture Room for the nurses. These
additions brought the bed capacity to 39.

1978 – Front steps removed to make
Ambulance patient access much easier

1980 – Administration Block & Board room
1983 – Plans drawn up for a Day Care
Centre & amenities for visiting
physiotherapist & dentist. Facilities opened
in 1986.

Doctor's Consulting Room built 2023 – Today the hospital has 29 beds, 8 acute care, 21 residents and accident & emergency.

COMMUNITY HALL UPGRADE



Rate payers will be pleased to learn that the cost of the planned upgrade of the Riverton Community Hall will be less than anticipated. The original costing for repairs of \$1 000 000 is now estimated to be just over \$400 000, following engineering reports by Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council.

The scaffolding will remain in place due to the front façade being in danger of collapsing onto the footpath and road. Riverton Community Hall Committee chair, Gary Davis, said that,

although the scaffolding is both an eyesore and inconvenience due to the footpath being blocked off, safety is paramount.

RIVERTON COMMUNITY HALL UPDATE

The Riverton Community Hall
Options Report was presented
to Council at its meeting on
Wednesday 15 March 2023.
Council have received the Report
and have requested 2 things:
- Costing estimates are
developed for Options A and C
of the Report.
- Cost estimates are developed
for the structural works that

need to be undertaken to shore up the building.
Council do not want to move further with the project until they have a better understanding on how much it will cost to fix the building as well as refurbish it as proposed.
Once they have the costs, they'll determine what they want to do with the building.

OPTION A PROPOSED

- Fully enclosing the veranda to connect the Main Hall, Supper Room / Kitchen and exterior toilets
- Refurbishing the exterior toilets
- Replacing the interior toilets adjacent to the bar with an access WC and shower.

It involves refurbishing the existing internal and external WCs, while retaining their current locations, and maintaining the existing footprint of the Main Hall.

OPTION C

- Partially enclosing the veranda to connect the Main Hall and the Supper Room / Kitchen
- Converting the existing toilets adjacent to the Bar into three new unisex ambulant toilets
- Converting the existing store adjacent to the bar into an access toilet and shower
- Refurbishing the existing unisex ambulant toilets adjacent to the Kitchen

This option retains the Main Hall footprint and the existing toilet locations but involves a more extensive refurbishment of the internal toilets than Option A, and proposes that the existing storeroom adjacent to the Bar is converted to an access toilet.

Hats off to the ANZACs ... and a town.

You could easily pass through Riverton, a picturesque settlement about 100km north of Adelaide, nestled next to the Gilbert River and the once thriving railway line to the copper mines at Burra, without taking much notice. Like many South Australian towns, there are some historic buildings parked behind lines of exotic trees, a pretty oval, and golf course, but also a feeling that this town has seen better days. However, if you take a closer look, you will notice that this country town is as neat as a pin, all street gardens are well-tended, and there are annuals in 'Holy Acre' inscribed plant boxes up and down the concourse. There is something happening here. A community. People with love and civic pride working co-operatively. And doing it for others to enjoy.



If you had been driving through on Sunday April 23rd, you might have noticed clusters of people around tables and chairs and bikes in their lovely Scholz Park. A number of locals, together with the Riverton RSL, had organised a community event, combining a walk or cycle along the Rattler Trail - which starts (or ends) in this town - with a tribute to our ANZACs.

After event co-ordinator, Sid Wrangles, had paid tribute to the members of the Australian Cycling Corps, formed in Egypt in 1916 during World War I, there was a short commemoration ceremony and a minute's silence.

Following the 'Ride to Remember the ANZACs' there were games for the young ones, a smithy working the forges in their museum and a generous Community BBQ.



On a closer look you might have noticed quite a few of the attendees were wearing 'Sprocket Rocket' hi-vis jerseys. This social cycling and coffee-ing club was started in the Barossa Valley 3 years ago, and maybe surprisingly, and certainly most fortunately, Riverton locals, Sid and Cath Wrangles, were formative members. They make a weekly 45-minute car trip to Tanunda to cycle and coffee and join in.

It wasn't long before Cath and Sid enticed Riverton friends, Ross and Jill Kemp, Neil Rogers, Tracey and Brian Wostikow, Magda and Garry Davies (a little further away) and Leon and Di Schwarz to 'Sprocket Rocket' as well. Leon and Di were also a big part of the organisational team for this 'Ride to Remember' day.





I think it's probably now fair to say that for the Barossians in the Sprocket Rockets Club, Riverton feels like a second home. This little town, which was once just a chance to slow down along the Barrier Highway, has a beating heart. It's got great pubs, wonderful shops, and café -The Emporium. It has character and exudes friendliness.

Do yourself a favour and watch out for 'Ride to Remember the ANZACs' day in Scholz Park next year. And hats off to all the people who sacrificed lives to make this country free and great – and to people in small towns who put others first to create and stimulate friendship and love. Walara Gilbert Valley Significant Development Launched

The Walara Board met at Walara Gilbert Valley Thursday afternoon 25 May 2023 as part of their monthly meetings and connection with local community.

Chair, Malcolm May, said it was great to meet residents and staff at the Home and

pleasing to get positive feedback on the seamless integration of Gilbert Valley with Walara.

Malcolm said that he also observed a very positive feeling with all present which is testament to the great work of staff in supporting residents in their own home.

During the visit Malcolm was pleased to announce the \$3.53m redevelopment of the site funded by the Australian Government Department of Health and Aged Care. The funding was an increase on the \$1.894m previously announced in late 2021.

Board Member and local resident, Matthew Greenslade, said he was so proud of the work undertaken, lead by Rob Veitch, to secure the funding which will see the upgrading of existing rooms, expanding of 5 existing ensuites, widening of doorways and construction of 4 additional rooms.

Malcolm, Matthew and Walara Gilbert Valley Director of Care, Monica Ostigh, Hodgkinsons Architect, Dario Salvatore, and Juncken Builders, Jason Billing, participated in launching the redevelopment that afternoon.

These included visits to Adelaide Zoo, Regency campus of TAFE, MOD – the Museum of Discovery, City West campus of the University of South Australia, a challenge finding their way around the city and the Careers Expo at Wayville Showgrounds.

The first three weeks of term 2 has seen a flurry of activity on the RDHS farm. The harvest produced a bumper crop of wine grapes. The livestock continues to be popular with a huge number of students choosing to be involved with preparation of the sheep and cattle for the Royal Show. Year 11 students have been busy conducting field trials with various forage crops under irrigation this term. Year 9 students are eagerly awaiting the arrival of the dairy calves which form an integral part of the 'Cows Create Careers' program.
