Charlie began his football career playing juniors at MinMan Eagles Sporting Club. In 2018, while a student at Riverton Primary School, representing Mid North SAPSASA Football team, Charlie was selected in the Under 12's State Team. Playing in Canberra, the team won a Bronze medal.

Continuing to play for Min Man with his brother & cousins, Charlie's successes included winning premierships and a Mail Medal for North Eastern Football Association.

Charlie was selected to play in the Under 15 carnival for Central Districts Football Club which led to training with the Under 16 squad at Elizabeth. Along the journey, Charlie played two years in the Under 16 & Under 18 Central Districts Football teams and captained the

Under 18 side. In 2023, he was selected in the Under 18 State squad as an underage player. Playing for the' Doggies' in 2024, Charlie was again selected in the state squad where the training and experience helped him mature as a player.

Leading up to the AFL Draft, Charlie had over 15 extensive interviews with AFL Clubs, some at the farm at Tarlee and others in Melbourne. It was a nervous wait for draft night And then it happened! His dream of playing AFL football as a career has taken a great step.

Despite all the travel, early mornings & late nights, Charlie has continued his schooling and recently completed year 12.

During her brief official visit, Her Excellency visited Scholz Park, Riverton & District High School & Light Gallery.



At Scholz Park Museum, Her Excellency met with members of the committee. She was given a brief history of the museum and a tour of the buildings. The committee members found Her Excellency to be friendly, warm & very interested in this part of our local history.

At Riverton & District High School, her Excellency met with the school captains & SRC students. They discussed the importance of leadership and understanding how to make their voices count. Her Excellency's key message was 'Strong communities are built on the actions and voices of the people in the community'.





At the Light Gallery, Her Excellency & Mr Bunten praised the art works of renowned local artists, Robert Hannaford & Alison Mitchell.

Greg McLeod, from Scholz Park Museum committee, said," Unfortunately, time was short as these tours are scheduled tightly but it was a very enjoyable experience."

RIVERTON COMMUNITY HALL 150 YEARS



Riverton Community Hall had its beginnings as the Riverton Institute.

The first meeting to consider building an Institute was held at the Mill Inn on 22 May 1873. In due course, Allotment 26 was bought

from Mr J. E. Hannaford for £50 and the foundation stone was laid on 12 June 1874.

Riverton Institute was officially opened on 3 December 1874 at an approximate cost of £1,400. The original building was single storey and included a reading room and a library.

The two-storey front was added in 1897. By 1910, the original floor was renewed. In 1914, the Institute Hall had to be extended, and a small supper room was added.



By 1930, more accommodation was necessary, so the upper room was enlarged and the kitchen added.

In 1960, the property next door was purchased from Miss Knauerhase to enable extensions or alterations to the Institute to take place, when required.

The opening of these additions and renovations to the Riverton Community Hall took place on 26 July 1985, the cost being \$210,800.

Over the passage of time, a large variety of functions have taken place within the hall – dances, meetings, roller skating, movie sessions, reunions, dinners and flower shows, just to name a few.

Moving forward, the nature of these functions has changed to accommodate the changing needs of the local community.

The functions that may take place within the Community Hall in the future may not have any semblance with what has taken place in the past.

Regardless of whatever proposed development may be considered for Riverton in the future, there will always be a need for the Riverton Community Hall to meet the

needs of the local community.

So, whereto with the Riverton Community Hall in the coming decades?

Presently, a two-stage project is underway. Stage One – Remediation Works

Council has appointed Mykra Pty Ltd to undertake remediation works at the Riverton Community Hall which will include nominated structural repair woks, including but not limited to the roof, stage and drainage. It is anticipated that these works will be completed by the end of 2024.

Stage Two – Refurbishment of Riverton Community Hall

Through extensive public consultation, it was identified that Riverton Community Hall needed a major refurbishment to bring its facilities up to appropriate present-day standards as well as provide additional facilities which will benefit the community and other users of the Hall in years to come.

Presently, a proposal is before Council seeking consent to apply for a grant to address this refurbishment, the cost of which is estimated to be about \$1.4m.

It is hoped that approval is granted so that the grant application can be submitted.

Whether the grant application will be successful is in the hands of the appropriate authorities but, hopefully, it will be, so that Riverton Community Hall can receive its first major upgrade in forty years.



So, from humble beginnings, Riverton Community Hall has now turned 150 years old.

While the Stage One Remediation Works are presently underway, the Hall portion of the building is presently unavailable. It is hoped that the celebration of Riverton Community Hall's 150th anniversary can be organised early in 2025.

May Riverton Community Hall continue to be an important, valued, asset for the Riverton community for generations to come.

OLD 120L BINS

Green bodied 120L general waste bins will not be replaced for damage due to the age of these original bins. Residents are required to purchase a 140L bin from Clare Valley Waste if their 120L bin is damaged.

New bins can be purchased from Clare Valley Waste, ring 0438 884 340

KERBSIDE BIN PLACEMENT

Bins should be placed at the kerbside by 6am on the collection day. Keep a minimum distance of 1 metre between bins, parked cars, street trees and infrastructure. Bins must be brought in on the day they are emptied.

Your bin will not be collected if it is:

- packed too tightly and will not empty
- too heavy
- · over-full
- all bins MUST have the lid closed, when excess waste is in the bin and the truck picks up the bin, it is more likely the lid may be damaged, Lids CLOSED please.

You can purchase compostable liners for your kitchen caddy or line the caddy with newspaper to contain the scraps before placing them in the green bin.

No food scraps in the red lidded general waste bin.
