Redevelopment

With the Walara Gilbert Valley refurbishment official opened on Friday 25 July 2025, it was great to see so many residents from the community, residents, staff. and McDonald Director, Department of Health & Aged Care (DHAC) Adelaide, Federal Member for Grey, Tom Venning, State Member for Frome, Penny Pratt, and State Member for Tony Piccolo participating in the Liaht. celebration and to recognise the significant contribution of James Huppatz on behalf of the Huppatz family in the official opening of their respective new wing.

Following the speeches and ribbon cutting, plaques were unveiled, tours of the refurbished facility conducted, and then a sumptuous afternoon tea and hot cuppa enjoyed by the many guests who attended, along with some of our valued residents at Walara Gilbert Vallev. The \$6.8 million redevelopment, which commenced in mid-2023, has seen increase in bed numbers for aged care in the area from 27 to 35. Please note the new entry will be in use from Thursday 7 August, with additional details to follow directly to residents' families.

The occupancy at Walara Gilbert Valley is currently above mid-range, so with our new rooms recently completed, several vacancies

Hall refurbishment to go ahead



The Clare and Gilbert Valleys Council has been awarded a \$770,000 grant through the South Australian Government's Enabling Infrastructure Program to refurbish the Riverton Community Hall.

This funding is part of the \$15 million Thriving Regions Fund, which supports infrastructure projects that strengthen regional communities.

The Riverton Community Hall, established in 1874, is a cherished civic space that has served as a hub for community and cultural activities.

Despite its historical significance, the hall has faced structural and accessibility challenges, including termite damage, outdated facilities, and non-compliant amenities

In response, the Council engaged Phillips/ Pilkington Architects to develop refurbishment plans aimed at modernising the hall while preserving its heritage character.

Proposed upgrades include structural repairs, kitchen and restroom renovations, improved accessibility and enhanced performance infrastructure.

Community consultations emphasised the importance of maintaining the hall's historical integrity while enhancing its functionality.

"The Riverton Community Hall has long stood

as a symbol of civic pride and community spirit," Mayor Allan Aughey OAM said.

"This significant investment by the State Government recognises both the historical value of the hall and its continued role as a vital gathering place for our residents.

"The refurbishment project will ensure the hall is not only preserved for future generations, but also made fit for contemporary community use.

"On behalf of Council, I extend our sincere gratitude for this support, which reflects a shared commitment to strengthening the social fabric of our regions."

The Council's commitment to the Riverton Community Hall refurbishment reflects a broader strategy to invest in facilities that foster community engagement and support regional development.

The refurbishment project is expected to commence within six months and be completed within two years, aligning with the grant program's requirements.

This initiative will revitalise a key community asset, ensuring it continues to serve as a vibrant venue for events and gatherings in the Riverton area.

Trophy Returns Home



On Saturday 26th July Mr Philip Duigan, President of the Dashwood Gully Cricket Club, Kangarilla, travelled to Riverton football oval to find a final resting place for a football trophy, initially from Marrabel Football Club, dated 1939, that his family had in their possession.

The trophy had gained some notoriety as a defacto trophy for a Centenary Boxing Day cricket match at the Duigan property, Pakhurst Estate, Kangarilla, in 1999. The match was something of a re-enactment with period dress worn by all 22 players, with somewhat modified rules. Due to the significance of the Centenary match, it was decided that a trophy was needed. A member of the club discovered the trophy (pictured) in an antique shop in Ballarat and thought that it was appropriate for the occasion.

Philip Duigan rediscovered the trophy while decluttering and thought that it should be returned to either the Slattery family or Marrabel Football Club.

Through researching Riverton via the internet and finding Kaye McInerney as one of the editors of The Local Rag, a phone conversation began the following story.

The story began with the Marrabel Football Club in 1939. The "Fairest and Most Brilliant" trophy that year was presented to W (Bill) Slattery by Mr HS (Harold) Rowett ESQ of Marrabel. Bill Slattery had also played league football for North Adelaide.

He lived at Waterloo with his wife, Jean, in a

house and farm just north of Waterloo. They didn't have any children and there are no known descendants to whom to return the trophy.

Bill was a fine athlete and quite a character. Not unlike a lot of those with an Irish history at that time, he didn't mind a drink (or two) and was known to have bet on anything that moved.

Presenter of the trophy was Harold Rowett, a former player and administrator at Marrabel Football Club.

As many know, Marrabel Football Club no longer exists as an individual club. Saddleworth and Marrabel football clubs amalgamated in 1964 and Saddleworth/ Marrabel amalgamated with Riverton in 1976, now called RSMU or the Mighty Hawks.

President of RSMU Football Club, Steve Ball, received a phone call late Friday night that Philip Duigan was coming to the game at Riverton next day to reunite the trophy with its rightful owners. Consequently, there was only time for a quiet, personal handover of the trophy which I believe suited Philip well.

Philip, his son, Henry, and grandson, Malee, met with RSMU President, Steve Ball, Harold Rowett's grandson, Ian, and great grandson, David, both of whom have been and are still actively involved in RSMU (see photos). Later, Mitchell Rowett, Harold's great great grandson, a talented young junior and future star for RSMU, was also able to have a photo with Philip.

The trophy will be refurbished and remain in the RSMU Clubrooms at Riverton.

If you were walking past the outdoor dining area of the Tarlee Bakery around 1:30pm on Monday 23rd of June, no doubt you would have felt the buzz of excitement around the unveiling of the incredible mosaic that now hangs proudly for all to marvel at. Tarlee has once again proven that when regional South Australians come together, remarkable things happen.

In a heartfelt celebration of teamwork, creativity and generosity, community members gathered to recognise the many hands that brought a unique new feature to life in the heart of town.

Six Months of Passion and Purpose

What started as a simple idea grew over six months into a vibrant symbol of Tarlee's spirit. The idea of creating something as a thank you for Scott and Shannon Mullins and all they do for the community, resulted in something truly spectacular. The project, spearheaded by a dedicated group of local women known as the *Tarlee Mosaic Group* — Alison Brandsma, Sue Decristofaro, Rosemary Dunn, Tracy Butter and Pam Hill — became a labour of love, fuelled by patience, encouragement, and shared wisdom. Their commitment to the community was acknowledged with sincere thanks.

The installation, rich in history and personal meaning, incorporates tiles, mirrors, crockery,

and jewellery — items donated and repurposed to reflect the charm and stories of Tarlee's past.

Bringing It All Together

Gavin Dunn engineered the stainless steel frame to support the giant artwork and essential forklift support needed to delicately move the two pieces into place. Ian 'Chippa' Andrews and Peter Dunn, were also part of the team charged with the hands-on installation process.

Sue, Rosemary and Gavin, all spoke to the crowd giving an insight to the hours of work that went into the project as well as thanking the many people who helped the project come to life; Raylee and Paul Vokes,

Merran and Brenton Riddle and the Tarlee Hall and Community Services Inc.

A Broader Message

Tarlee Hall and Community Services Inc. Chairman Andy Theobald opened the event welcoming everyone to the celebration. Clare and Gilbert Valleys Mayor Alan Aughey gave entertaining address to the crowd highlighting the of importance small communities in regional South Australia reminding us that there is "Strength in community — we are better together.". Member for Frome Penny Pratt and Councillor Ann Alder were also among the guests in attendance. Mayor Aughey had the pleasure of unveiling the mosaic to the crowd brimming with anticipation and collective admiration.

In true Tarlee fashion, the project stands as a reminder that when we work as one, we not only build something beautiful — we build lasting friendships and a stronger future for all.

The mosaic can be visited during Tarlee Bakery's opening hours. Children can also be involved in a 'Spot The..." activity by collecting the sheet and pencils from the inside the bakery.

The Three Valleys Story

Three Valleys came into existence, like many good ideas (and perhaps some bad ones) over a long lunch with friends. We were/are all looking to retire in the next five years, but wanted a project to retire into – and a new challenge. We all like a good gin, and thought why not give it a crack!!

We have 15 in our Three Valleys family, with a range of various jobs (or past jobs) and we all have been able to add differing skills to the venture. Carlo, our mechanical engineer helped us construct and install a still that has yet to explode (don't worry – we have been inspected and been passed by WorkSafe SA!), Justin the winemaker from Reilly's wines who impressed on us how the mouthfeel is all and Sonya who has a super palate – a particular gift that enables someone to be able to detect the different flavours that make up a wine – or a gin. Gerry, Sabine, Sonya and Steve became our distillers – who have the right combination of flair and science, with Chris and Phil will join them in training this year.

Peter and Carolyn had recently bought Glenferrie in Riverton, which contained the previous owner Chris Klaebe's pride and joy – a 5 car shed. An idea started to germinate... When the Three Valleys family came up to Riverton we all felt the charm of the town and the house and decided to base our gin venture here, and re-purpose the shed into a distillery We wanted our gins to reflect the history and the region – the three valleys of Clare, Gilbert and Barossa.

Our first gins were inspired by the Rieslings of the Clare and Barossa, and the Gilbert Valley was represented by the Assassin, named after the assassination of Percy Brookfield at Riverton in

the 1920s (well we could hardly call it The Percy). Since the initial three we have made another three – and have whisky maturing in barrels!

Whilst our distillers have been tutored by other distillers in town, and have done training through Adelaide University the making of gin has been a fascinating and interesting journey for all of us in the group. But, not without success – perhaps to our surprise our gins have won 5 silver medals and 2 bronze medals in gin competitions – not too shabby we feel for gin coming from the back shed!

The last Sunday of every month we open our distillery door for tastings and chatting. We are only small but Peter and Carolyn, assisted by Stan and Carmel and others from the group, would love you to pop in to your local distillery so we can share some gin and more stories!
