Australia Day Celebrations

Despite the hot weather, approximately 180 people attended the Australia Day celebrations at Riverton.

A delicious breakfast was again prepared and served by members of the Gilbert Valley Cricket Club.



Following the traditional Raising of the Flag, talented Riverton High School student, violinist Laura Kidby, led the National Anthem.



Councillor Ann Alder hosted the morning and welcomed guest speaker, Riverton's pharmacist, Dr Franklin Afinjuomo, who presented a fantastic story about how he came to be an Australian. Franklin shared his inspiring journey from growing up in Nigeria to eventually migrating to Australia where he completed his PhD. He feels very blessed to be an Australian, especially as he is able to be a business owner. He spoke warmly of the support he has received and expressed his gratitude for living and working in Riverton.

The Clare & Gilbert Valley Citizen of the Year 2026 was awarded to Roz Rowett. Roz was recognised for decades of outstanding service across faith, health, education, wellbeing and community life. Her contributions include nursing, pastoral care, youth and family support, leadership within the Anglican Church, health and wellbeing programs, and extensive volunteering. Her dedication, compassion and quiet leadership were widely acknowledged as making a profound impact on the community.

John Glistak, Chairperson of Riverton Community Management Committee, presented the Riverton Community Awards.



The Community Hero/Champion Award was presented to Matthew Greenslade for his long-standing service to the Riverton community. In addition to his hard work in his family business, Matthew has served on numerous boards and other committees. He is a very capable, humorous and eloquent public speaker, and has been called upon on many occasions to MC, speak and entertain the audience.



The Exceptional High School Student Award was awarded to Oscar Bastian of Riverton High School, recognised for his strong academic motivation, love of reading and writing, and his advocacy to retain the School Community Library.



The Heart of the Community Award recognised the Scholz Park Blacksmith Competition, held on 28 September 2025. The event attracted around 200 people who watched nine blacksmiths create artistic works. Supported by several fundraising bodies and local groups, the event was praised for its strong community involvement and atmosphere.

The event concluded with congratulations to all award recipients for their significant contributions to the Riverton community.

2025 Christmas Parade & Carnival



It broke my heart when it became evident that no one was prepared to coordinate the Christmas celebrations in Riverton. I thought at the very least the parade could still happen.

Unfortunately, the previous coordinator of the parade was unable to commit, due to changes in legislation a rolling road closure was no longer able to take place and the cost of hiring the necessary signage to close roads was ridiculous. It seemed impossible.



I contacted the local MP's and Mr Tony Piccolo suggested I write to the Premier requesting a donation for the funds to cover hiring signage. Two days later Tony called me to confirm the donation was approved.

A couple of weeks earlier Jodie & Tamra offered to help me with the organising. Overjoyed with receiving the donation, it was full steam ahead to pull it together in nine days.

The weather was perfect and despite a modified parade route, the streets were lined with children and families waving and enjoying the parade as it passed by. Walara residents and staff were out the front of the home and patients at the hospital were able to view the parade from the windows along Moorehouse Tce.



Hi All,

Hope you had a good Australia Day long weekend too! Congratulations to Roz Rowett and Matt Greenslade on their recent Australia Day Awards, well deserved. Welcome to our new residents and their families to Walara, also welcome to new staff.

With the recent bout of extra hot weather, I take this opportunity to thank residents, families and staff for the way in which we have worked collectively to provide the best possible care and support to residents, staying safe and continuing to do so. Keep cool, hydrated and fire-safe.

With my first 12 months as CEO now completed, as an organisation we have continued to build on the significant improvements in our facilities and teams, as supported by our Board and previously Nino Di Sisto. This has involved increasing staff levels and achieving a sustainable aged care service of the lower north community and surrounds for the long term.

Short term staffing replacement along with constant Aged Care Reform have presented many challenges for Walara. It is pleasing the manner in which we have managed such changes, with the great contribution of residents, staff and the community. Congratulations to all.

Throughout last year, a small number of longstanding staff retired. I thank them for their significant contribution over many years and wish them well for the future. Each facility will have information in their respective newsletters, acknowledging and thanking staff.

A new Director of Care has been appointed at Walara Gilbert Valley (WGV) and will commence in March (more details to follow). I welcome Melanie Montgomery as the new Human Resources Manager, who starts with us in February. Residents, families and staff can be confident in the passion, confidence and skills that they will bring to the positions to continue Walara's great work. Congratulations Melanie and I am confident that you all will make her feel welcome.

Previously I have mentioned the challenges in managing respiratory illnesses. A few weeks ago, we ceased twice-weekly Rapid Antigen Testing following several staff having Influenza A at Walara Hamley Bridge (WHB). I am pleased to report that not one resident contracted Influenza A over the Christmas New Year period, with our additional Infection Protection and Control practices in place. This was worthwhile as a supported approach and one that we are likely to continue around long weekends and festive periods, especially where the local GP clinic is aware of any increase in respiratory illness or gastro community cases. Thank you all for your patience and support for this approach.

Walara is soon to complete the very last stage of our \$7M WGV refurbishment, about to commence the WAS redevelopment (\$21M grant), and will apply for funding to upgrade WBM in the near future. At WBM 4 x 2 Bedroom staff accommodation units (\$2M grant) are being constructed by GJ Gardener Builders, they are nearing lock-up stage with the roofing going on soon and are 60% complete.

Best wishes to TLR for the year ahead, and keep cool, hydrated and fire-safe during the coming days!

\$3 Million Boost for Riverton Library

Riverton is set to benefit from a \$3 million State Government investment to upgrade the community library facilities at Riverton & District High School. Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council has welcomed the announcement as a major win for both students and the wider community.

Mayor Allan Aughey said the funding will address the poor condition of the existing library and support the development of a modern, safe and functional space designed for shared school and community use.

Council will work closely with the State Government, the school and the community as the project progresses, with the final design and services shaped through consultation. The investment secures the future of library services in Riverton and will deliver lasting benefits for local residents.

Council also acknowledged the advocacy of Tony Piccolo MP in supporting this important regional infrastructure project.
